He was afterwards twice honored with the Command of the Army in Great Britain. This Monument is Erected to his Memory

Above this Inscription, a plain white marble funeral urn surmounted by:-

Arms, (on an oval shield) 3 tilting spears erect or, headed arg. (for Amherst) encircled by a ribbon gu. bearing the motto, Tria juncta in Uno, or, conjoined with, on another oval shield, The Arms of Amherst (as above) impaling Arg. on a Bend sa. 3 roses of the field, barbed and seeded ppr. (for Cary) encircled by a ribbon az. Pendant beneath, between the shields, The Badge of the Most Honble. Order of the Bath ppr.

Crest: On a wreath, or & gu. a turf vert, and on it 3 tilting spears, 1 erect and 2 saltirewise or, headed arg. encircled/with a garland vert.

Supporters:- On the dexter side, A Canadian War Indian, his exterior arm embowed, holding a war axe ppr., rings on his nose and ears and bracelets on his arms and wrists arg., over his shoulders 2 buff belts in saltire, one with his powder horn, the other holding his scalping knife; before, a small apron az., stringed gu., having also gaiters az. seamed or, the legs fettered and fastened with a chain to the bracelet on the exterior wrist. On the sinister side, a like Canadian Indian, holding in his exterior hand a staff arg., thereon a scalp ppr.

With, surmounting all the above, a Baron's Coronet, ppr.

Family of Kentish origin. JEFFERY AMHERST was rector of HORSMONDEN in Kent in 17th century. He died in 1662. His grandson, another

JEFFERY AMHERST, born 1649, was the younger member of a PEMBURY family. He came to BROOK'S PLACE, RIVERHEAD, about 1690. He married ELIZABETH YATES, a Sussex girl, and their heir was another

JEFFERY AMHERST, who married ELIZABETH KERRILL of HADLOW. They had nine children, seven of whom were sons, and the second of these was yet another

JEFFERY AMHERST. (1717-1797) who became the famous Field-marshal. This Jeffery lived at Brook's Place, Riverhead for a time. When a Major-General he took command of an Eroi dition to North America in 1758. He succeeded James Quercromby as Commander-in-Chief in the same year and the following year took Ticonderoga and Crown Point, and shared in the capture of Montreal. He bacame Governor General of British NorthAmerica and was knighted in 1761, and held the Governorship of Virginia in 1763 and was made Governor of Guernsey in 1770. In 1772 he became a Privy Councillor and was created BARON AMHERST OF HOLMESDALE in 1776. His promotion to Field-marshal took place in 1796. He married twice. During his later life he publed down the family residence called Brook's Place, and built instead a mansion house which he called MONTREAL. This house stood on higher ground a little to the south of the Brook's Place site. It was recently demolished, and the Estate has now been parcelled up for building.

Not far from Sevenoaks, on the main Maidstone road, there is a little Inn known as the Crown Point Inn, and the sign board mentione Sir Jeffery Amherst.

His younger brother JOHN AMHERST, became Admiral of the Blue. Was Flag Captain in Eat/IndieSand North America in 1755 and Commander in Chief at Plymouth in 1776. He died in 1778 and was buried at Sevenoaks. Another brother,

WILLIAM AMHERST married Elizabeth Patterson of London. He also was a soldier and was Col. of the 32nd Regt. of Foot. He died in 1781 and was buried at Sevenoaks. His son,

WILLIAM PITT AMHERST (1773-1857) became EARL AMHERST OF ARAKAN in 1826. He was Governor General of India 1823-8, and died at Knole, Sevencaks in 1857.

Subject to two life interests, he left all of his property "for such unsectarian charities, as his trustees may in their sole discretion select, directing that not more than £500 from this fund is to be given to any one institution."

Mr. Frederick Locock, of Arley House, Lillington-road, Leamington Spa, who died on June 6, aged 78, left estate of the gross value of £120,476, of which the net personalty has been sworm at £111,674. He bequeathed £400 to the churchwardens of the Sevendaks Parish Church upon trust for such parochial charities as they may think fit, conditional upon their keeping in order his grave and monument, and failing the observance of this condition the bequest to revert to Queen Charlotte's Lying-in Hospital.

CREMATION AND A SERVICE AT GOLDER'S GREEN.

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The body of the late Earl Amherst, who died on Sunday at his seat, Montreal, near Sevenoaks, was cremated yesterday morning at Golder's Green.

was cremated yesterday morning at Golder's Green. The only persons present were Captain the Hon. Hugh Amnerst, the last surviving brother of the late peer, and his successor in the earldom, the Rev. George F. Bell, vicar of Riverhead, Sevenoaks, and another mourner.

While the cremation was in progress a short service was conducted in the Crematorium Chapel by Mr. Bell, at which specially selected prayers were read. The ashes were subsequently gathered in the presence of Captain Amherst and other mourners and placed in a leaden urn. This had been specially prepared before his lordship's death. It was subsequently conveyed to the family seat at Montreal, with the view to interment in the Amherst vauit in the crypt of the church at Riverhead to-morrow. head to-morrow.

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
